Course Description: This course is an introduction to Macro Economy phenomena. It will focus on the interaction and behavior between household, firm, and government, and the result of such interaction on a Macro level. Topics covered include concept of GDP and national income, economy growth, unemployment, inflation, business cycle, and macroeconomic policies (fiscal and monetary policy).

Course Objects: Upon finishing the class, students will learn the basic knowledge needed to understand the working of Macro Economy. They will be able to read and understand the news, artitles, and special columns in Wall Street Journal or The Economists, discussing issues such as economic growth, tax reform, or the influence of fiscal and monetary policy. Also, students will be equiped with the knowledge to understand and calculate GDP, unemployment rate, nominal and real intrest rate, and exchange rates. Morever, they can apply the knowledge to explain short term economic fluctutaion, using the concepts including aggreate demand, aggregate supply, and expectations. This course lays the foundation for future study on intermediate Macro theory.

Form of the Class: This is a lectural class. Students are encrouaged to ask questions during the class. And I will give example questions similar to questions which will show up in the assignment and exams.

Class Material: Slides for the class are provided in the Modeules section.

Holidays: There will be no class on holidays. The holidays which will influence our calss schedule are **Fall Break** from Oct. 8^{th} to Oct. 15^{th} , and **Thanksgiving Break** from Nov. 23^{th} to Nov. 26^{th} .

Order of Topics: Generally speaking, the order of topics will follow the topics listed in table of contents from the textbook. But we will skip **chapter 9** and **chapter 15**. Each chapter will take two or three classes.

Grading Components:

Assignments (35%): For every two or three weeks, there will be an assignment on the contents covered in the class. Every assignment will be posted online in Canvas in the Assignments section. You can choose either submit a file containing your answers to Canvas, or hand in written answers on paper in class. Usually, the assignment will be due before the class on Tuesday.

Midterm (25%): The midterm exam will be on Otc. 17^{th} , the Tuesday after the fall break. It will be an in-class exam, from 9:00 AM to 10:30 AM.

Final (30%): The final exam will be on Dec. 14^{th} , a Thursday, from 8:00 AM to 10:00 AM in the classroom we usually meet.

Attendance (10%): Students are required to attend the class. I will randomly take records of attendance.
