Course Objectives: This course is intended to provide students with an

analytical framework necessary to understand how events in the global

economy affect national economies and vice versa. The course is broadly

divided into four topics: (1) international trade, (2) international trade policy,

(3) exchange rate and open-economy macroeconomics, and (4) international

macroeconomic policy. This course is a systematic survey of the workings of the global economy, patterns of international trade and policy, national income and international monetary arrangements, as well as foreign investment, with applications drawn from real world events.

Prerequisite: ECON 2010 and ECON 2020 (or ECON 1010 and instructor's consent).

Course Requirements: There will be two exams (a midterms and a final) and two assignments. The weight of each exam is 35 percent, and the weight of assignments is 30 percent of your final grade. Please read required chapters of textbook before you attend class. Also, please finish assignment on time.

 Disruptive behavior includes, but is not limited to, reading newspaper, using cell phones... etc.


