Course Goals:

The goal of Economics 2010 is to familiarize students with the basic concepts of microeconomics. Introductory microeconomics provides students with an overview of the tools of economic analysis that will be helpful in understanding future economics courses and issues that arise in business and law. During this class we will cover the topics of exchange, the formation of prices, the structure of the firm, the process of production, competition, monopoly, monopolistic competition, market failure, and other issues.
